3.	What does it mean to go "into temptation"? Is this the same as being tempted?	
4.	Consider 1 Tim 6:9, 1 Cor 10:13, 2 Pet 2:9. How does these help you distinguish the difference between being tempted and entering into temptation?

5.	Why would pray that God wouldn't "lead" us into temptation?
6.	Read James 1:13. Does God tempt men? How should we see Matt 6:13 in light of the James passage?
	ay 2 Matt 6:9-13 again. What is contrasted with being led into temptation in Matt 6:13?
8.	What does it mean to be delivered from evil?
9.	How does this contrast help us understand the request of the verse?
10	Read Luke 22:31-32. What is the meaning of the term "Satan has demanded permission to sift you like wheat" in V31? What can WE learn from Christ's warning?

11. Who in the Old Testament is the prime example of God allowing Satan's intervention into a Godly person's life? What were the circumstances.
12. Read John 17:13-19, especially V15. What is the background of the passage in John? What is John 17:15 referring to as related to "leading us not into temptation"?
13. In thinking about the John 17 passage, how do you reconcile Jesus' sacrifice which has "defeated" Satan?

15. Read Psalm 38:9. How does this passage reinforce Matthew 6:8?

16.	Re-read Matthew 6:13. Most bible versions have a footnote prior to the phrase "for yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen." What do you learn from the footnote?
17.	Read 1 Chronicles 29:11. What similarities do you see in 29:11 and end of Matthew 6:13?
18.	Read Matthew 6:9-10. What truths are reinforced in both of these verses?
19.	In V13, why is it appropriate to acknowledge that all is God's kingdom, power, and glory?
20.	Re-read V's 9-13. Why is the "Amen" placed at the end of V13, and what in general does the word mean.
21.	How has this series on Matt 6:9-13 shaped your prayer life? How might it shape your prayer life moving forward?
