## Sermon Study Equipping Class

#### Psalm 34

Next Sunday, March 1, is our annual DNOW weekend Sunday. This is a weekend of focused time for the students to sit under the preaching of God's Word and in-depth discipleship. This year the focus of DNOW is on the fear of God specifically as an antidote to fearing man. Our DNOW speaker is Todd Murray. Todd is the pastor of family ministries at Grace Immanuel Bible Church in Jupiter, Florida. Prior to joining the staff of Grace Immanuel in 2011, Todd, a graduate of Moody Bible Institute and Moody Graduate School, had been on staff at The Bible Church of Little Rock, Arkansas, for 28 years. He is the author of "Beyond Amazing Grace: Timeless Wisdom from the Letters, Hymns, and Sermons of John Newton" and "Love Beyond Degree" a commentary on Hosea, and has composed and recorded several collections of worship songs. In addition to training and shepherding families at Grace Immanuel, Todd teaches at The Expositors Seminary. He and his wife Tandy have been married since 1982 and are the parents of 5 children, two grown and married (David Todd and Heather) and three still at home (Blair, Glenn, and Emma Grace), and two grandchildren.

Remember to begin your study early in the week so that you have time to really think (and keep thinking) about the passage without being rushed.

#### ❖ Day 1

#### Read Psalm 34.

For these lessons, the sermon text is provided in a format that visually helps display the structure of the paragraph or section of text. Commands are double-underlined. Generally, the main indicative clauses remain to the left, and the other clauses are either directly underneath when they have equal priority to what comes before, or are tabbed to the right when the clause supports, develops, or draws a conclusion from a neighboring clause.

3.	How does David respond to God's deliverance? Why is this an appropriate response to such deliverance?
4.	David recounts God's deliverance (4-6). Have you had situations where the Lord 'delivered' you?
5.	Why is it valuable to recount God's deliverance to others?

17. In what areas in your life are you in desperate need? What counsel do you think that David would give you based on this Psalm?
18. How does this Psalm affect the way that we relate to unbelievers?
19. Why do you think that David was motivated to write this Psalm?
In preparation for Sunday, pray for a brokenhearted attitude toward God. Ask that you would experience that sense of being 'crushed in spirit' that is pleasing to Him. Ask him for faith so that you would trust him in the difficulties of life. Ask for perseverance to believe in his sovereign deliverance even when your troubles are overwhelming. Pray that he would reveal sin that is incompatible with a sense of Christian humility. Pray for the students and DNOW weekend – that God would use his Wor in their lives to convict them of sin and show them the sufficient salvation that is offered there.
