
Manual Introduction

Overview

This packet is your primary source for The Well's Community Group structures. It allows you to have a reference for Family Gathering, Scattering Together, and leading 3D groups. These documents are a reference, not a rule book. The details of community may not be covered, but these high-level structures allow you a starting place to work with your CG Coach to develop a specific vision and strategy for your specific community group.

Community Vision

At The Well, we live as families on mission through the structures of our community groups. We do this together while centering our lives on Christ and move toward neighbors, co-workers, and friends to demonstrate and declare the good news of who Jesus is.







Gospel

Jesus called His disciples to follow Him towards the lost (Mt4.19-20). We walk with Jesus and the people in our Community Group to grow in their discipleship to Jesus while we follow Him towards the lost. This happens in the formal Community Group rhythms and ordinary moments of life.

Role

- 1. Grow as a disciple of Jesus and seek Him as you grow in leadership.
- 2. Take responsibility to lead a Community Group to grow in their discipleship to Christ, depth of relationship, and mission to reach the lost.
- 3. Shepherd/Care for members of your Community Group to the best of your ability. Empower your group to reach the lost to the best of your ability.
- 4. Execute and oversee the rhythms of a Community Group (tailoring them for your given context and group).

Expectation

- 1. Be a current Member of The Well and growing disciple of Jesus.
- 2. Lead (or oversee shared leadership) for the three value driven rhythms of a Community Group: A. Christ Centered Vision via Family Meal. B. Depth of Discipleship/Relationship via 3D's C. Demonstrating + Declaring the Gospel via Scattered Times.
- 3. Regular communication with your Community Group Coach (Elder Couple) and attendance at all Community Group Leader Trainings.
- 4. Respond to new member connections within 48 hours, and communicate with The Well when you are unable to make the connection.
- 5. Identify and disciple shared leadership, and co-leaders within the Community Group
- 6. Check in with all Community Group 3D leaders on a monthly basis.
- 7. Spend approximately 1 hour per week outside Community Group gatherings praying and planning for your group.





Purpose

FOLLOWING JESUS TOGETHER FOR THE GOOD OF THE WORLD

We exist to worship God, and see His worship spread over the whole earth. As this occurs we expect to see the gospel transform Silver Spring and surrounding region. We long for many people to trust Christ. We long to see Community Groups saturate every neighborhood and apartment community. We long to see the grace of God bring foretastes of His coming Kingdom. We long to plant new churches throughout the northern border of DC.

Values

FOLLOWING JESUS

Scripture:

I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me. Galatians 2:20 (ESV)

And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." Matthew 4:19 (ESV)

<u>Value: Christ Centered.</u> We are explicitly Christ-centered, worshiping God by orienting our entire lives around Him. Our Triune God has revealed Himself to us in His Son Jesus Christ. The gospel has changed every bit of our lives and we live for Him. The gospel both saves and sanctifies us. Christ is our Savior, example, and provision for a relationship with God and our lives of obedience to Him in His world. The Christ Centered scriptures reveal our God and shape our relationship with Him through the empowerment of the Spirit. The gospel shapes everything we do and all that we are about.

<u>Practice:</u> This primarily happens in the CG Family Meal where the CG shares about how Jesus is at work in each member's life and how He is working in the lives of people around us.

TOGETHER

Scripture:

And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. 43 And awe5 came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. 44 And all who believed were together and had all things in common. 45 And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need. 46 And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, 47 praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved.

Acts 2:42-47 (ESV)



<u>Value: Community/Family of Disciples</u>. We live our lives together as disciples of Christ in a diverse, unified, community of believers. We go deep in discipleship with one another by seeking Him in the scriptures and in prayer. We share our lives transparently together, that the real "me" would be known, loved, and embraced in real time. We give to each other sacrificially and generously. Programs and structures help foster these "family relationships," helping us integrate all of our lives, knitting together our "church friends" with neighbors, coworkers and friends.

<u>Practice:</u> This primarily happens in our CG 3D times as we share our lives transparently, read the scriptures together and pray for one another.

FOR THE GOOD OF THE WORLD

Scripture:

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Matthew 28:18-20 (ESV)

But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

Jeremiah 29:7 (ESV)

<u>Value: On Mission.</u> We are sent by God to see Him redeem people and bring about the restoration of His world. God has rescued us by grace through faith in the life, death and resurrection of Christ. We want the world to know and embrace Him. Mission catalyzes our decision-making and spending. We want to demonstrate the gospel by caring for the "least of these." We want to declare the gospel by explicitly sharing with "the lost." We pray and live in a way that God might multiply His kingdom through us at every level: individual disciples, CG's, and churches.

<u>Practice</u>: This primarily happens in the CG Scattered Times when we build relationships and share the gospel by celebrating and serving with and amongst the lost.





Connecting with Your Family on Mission

THE BASICS

Acts 2:42-47

We gather together as a family to share our lives around the table and plan to move together toward others in our neighborhood, including neighbors, coworkers, and friends. Family Gatherings should happen at least once a month on a regular day and time. Anyone in your Community Group can host, so try rotating locations. Create a hospitable environment – nothing fancy!

THE STRUCTURE

Family Gatherings should have three main components during each gathering:

- 1. **Mingle and Chat** (15 min) Give people time to chat informally. This is a great time to check in with people and finish setting up food.
- 2. **Meal** (45 min) Food is not just a tool to entice people to come. When you share your lives around a table, communities grow as you laugh and cry about real life moments. Try a potluck style, or have the host or leader plan the menu and then send an email to the group about what everyone can sign up to bring.

Ask the following questions while sharing a meal:

- 1. How is Jesus working in your life?
- 2. How is Jesus causing you to move toward others?
- 3. **Plan** (30 min) Intentionally make time to incorporate your lives together. Bring your calendars and plan Scatter Times. The responsibility for Scatter Times falls on each community member. The leader does not have to coordinate or attend every single one. Many times the entire group will not be able to attend. For example, if someone expresses interest in serving, ask them to plan a serving activity for the group.
- 4. **Pray** (30 min) Spend time in prayer specifically for each other. Pray that God would use your community to demonstrate and declare the gospel, and that neighbors, co-workers, and friends would come to know him. Instead of waiting until the end to pray, try to pray throughout your time together as people share around the table.





Building Relationships with Gospel Intentionality

THE BASICS

Look at all of your life intentionally as a missionary. We scatter together to live our lives on mission, to demonstrate and declare the gospel. Instead of adding more events to packed calendars, look at the natural rhythms of your life. Scatter Times offer a neutral and natural environment for anyone to feel comfortable to join, especially when you invite people to participate in activities they would do anyways. We suggest scattering together 2-3 times per month.

KEY RHYTHMS

Scatter Times typically fall under two key phrases:

- 1. Celebrate Throw or join a party to celebrate a holiday, birthday, or anniversary. Or just celebrate life with a cookout on Friday and invite neighbors, coworkers, and friends. The goal of celebrations is to build genuine relationships with the hope of engaging in explicit gospel conversations.
 - This looks different depending on your life stage. For example, if one of your coworkers wants to play trivia or join a running group, invite a small pocket of your community to join you. Or, maybe you want to put your kid in soccer. Invite other community parents to put their kids in the same soccer league, and engage with parents on the sidelines during practices and games.
- 2. Serve Demonstrate the gospel by meeting felt and tangible needs, including emotional and physical needs of people around you. Invite neighbors, coworkers, and friends to serve alongside your community and to love the city together. Don't feel like you have to create events from scratch. Join a community project or serve alongside a non-profit in your neighborhood. And when people ask why you serve, take the opportunity to share the gospel. (We can serve and give of ourselves because Jesus has sacrificed so much for us and loved us.)

NUTS & BOLTS

- Be intentional about what's on your calendar. It doesn't always have to be additional.
- Ask people to bring their calendars to Family Gatherings and plan dates together.
- Consider the season of the year. Be proactive to connect with people around holidays, in the warm weather, or at seasonal events.

3D Leader Job Description

GOSPEL

All Christians are called to make disciples and show others what it looks like to follow Jesus (Matthew 28:19). 3D Leaders have the privilege of walking alongside peers as they disciple each other through life, bible, and prayer.

ROLE

- 1. Execute and oversee the rhythms of a 3D Group Life, Bible, Prayer
- 2. Shepherd, support, and care for the 3D group members
- 3. Grow as a disciple of Jesus and improve in leadership skills

EXPECTATIONS

- 1. Shepherd and care for all members of your 3D to the best of your ability
- 2. Empower others to lead in the 3D gathering
- 3. Facilitate the 3D gathering using the 3D tools at The Well
- 4. Ability to articulate the gospel
- 5. Attend regular leader trainings
- 6. Work with Community Leader to help new people connect into 3D
- 7. Check-in with Community Leader and/or CG Elder once per month on how your 3D is doing
- 8. Spend approximately 15-30 minutes per week outside of 3D gathering and personal bible study to pray and plan for your 3D group



3D Meeting Guide

BIBLE (30 MIN)

Read and discuss a chapter (or less) of the bible together. Use the below two main questions to guide your discussion. Share what you learned in this passage as you read it on your own through the week, or as you read it together now (use the GROW tool or any of our other bible study guides found online for your personal study through the week). Jump in and out of prayer as you seek God together.

- 1. What does it say? Reflect and observe what God says in this passage. Consider words, themes, commands, promises, etc. Simply share all of the things that jump out to you about this passage.
- 2. What does it mean? Consider the context, commentaries, flow of thought, argument, and other passages of scripture to summarize the meaning. Summarize the main idea/principle of the passage.
- 3. How does the gospel inform or connect with this truth, highlighting God's provision to us in Christ, and compelling us to obey Him because of His grace?

LIFE (30 MIN)

Now focus on how the passage you read impacts your life. What difference does what you have just read/shared make in your life? So what?

Consider how God desires you to respond to who He is and what He has said. Be specific, tangible, real, honest, transparent. What is God calling you to do, not do, believe, confess, or share? Do not forget the gospel! Jesus has given you His righteousness. Jesus has forgiven you for your sin. His grace and acceptance compels us to obey.

Here are some questions to help facilitate deeper discussion:

- 1. What must you do (not do), or believe in light of what we have just read?
- 2. Is there something you need to celebrate or confess from the past week?
- 3. Who could you share this truth with (both a believer and non-believer)?
- 4. See supplementary questions on the bottom of this sheet.



PRAYER (15 MIN)

Spend time talking to God and praying for each other. Pray through any areas God has spoken to you through the given passage. Consider the following:

- 1. Praise God for who He is.
- 2. Confess sins, disobedience, or disbelief.
- 3. Thank God for His grace and provision.
- 4. Pray for people who don't yet know Him, by name.

SUPPLEMENTARY LIFE QUESTIONS

Below are some additional questions that we have found helpful for sharing our life together. Choose any that apply to the passage, or may spur conversation:

- 1. What am I to believe?
 - a. What do you doubt?
 - b. What is keeping me from trusting in God?
 - c. How has the Holy Spirit been growing your faith this week?
 - d. What unhealthy thoughts have been lingering in your mind?
 - e. Is there a promise you need to claim?
- 2. What am I to do?
 - a. How have you been disobedient to God this week? Something you have said, done, thought, looked at?
 - b. Have you avoided a step of obedience God wants you to take?
 - c. Are your relationships healthy and honoring to God? How has your love for others been incomplete? Is there someone with whom you need to reconcile, or share loving truth with?
 - d. Are you being sacrificial and generous with your love?
- 3. Whom can I tell?
 - a. Who is someone that does not yet know Jesus, that you sense God is moving you towards?
 - b. What is the next step towards them that you need to take?
 - c. What question could you ask a coworker, neighbor, friend, or family member that might spur deeper conversation?
- 4. Whom can I invite?
 - a. Is there a neighbor, coworker, friend, or someone at church you could invite to group next week?





GET IN IT: PRAY, REFLECT, OBSERVE

Read + Observe Everything Within the Passage - What Does it Say?

- 1. Before you start reading spend time **being still**. Ask God to show you what's on your heart and mind. Prayerfully ask Him for a desire to know and love Him more. Ask Him to meet you in this time with Him in the Bible and to change you to be more like His Son.
- 2. **Read the passage** a few times and carefully observe the words; give full attention to what it says. The purpose of *observation* is to saturate yourself completely with the content of the passage. Look for things such as: important words (what's being talked about), conjunctions (how is one idea connected to another), admonitions (something being commanded), contrasts, comparisons, illustrations, repeated phrases/words, mood, and grammatical construction (verb tenses, prepositional phrases, etc.). Linger here, listening to what God is saying in the detail of His words.
- 3. **Ask questions**. This is the bridge between *reading* the passage and *understanding* it. Don't rush this step (even if think you know the answers). Ask yourself many *questions for understanding* such as: Who is writing? Who are the characters? What's the meaning of...? I wonder why...? What's the relationship between...? What is written before and after the passage (context is everything)? What is unexpected in this passage? What rubs me wrong about this passage? How does this fit into the grand story of the scriptures (Creation, Fall, Redemption, Culmination)? What do I learn about myself from this passage? What do I learn about God in this passage? What is the definition of...? Etc.

RESOURCES: PRAY, INTERPRET, ANSWER

Tools to Help You Answer Your Questions - What Does it Mean?

The goal here is to use resources to help unleash the meaning. You want to be careful not to bring your own assumptions, perspectives, thoughts, background, and experiences to the text. Though our experiences are helpful, presuppositions can also result in an incorrect, shallow, or unbiblical meaning. Interpreting the passage flows out of your previous questions for understanding (above). Use some of these tools below to help you. Aim to discover the author's purpose in writing.

1. **Use the passage and surrounding context:** Look before, after, and in your passage to answer as many questions for understanding as possible. Allow scripture to interpret scripture. Context is everything.



- 2. **Pray.** Reading the Bible is your conversation with God. Remember to keep talking with Him. Ask Him for clarity and answers; wrestle with Him over hard truths. Confess, rejoice, seek Him.
- 3. **Define words**: Look in a dictionary to discover the meaning of key words.
- 4. **Compare translations:** Read the passage in several translations to hear it afresh.
- 5. **Study cross-references**: Use the footnotes to find similar verses. We recommend the ESV Study Bible.
- 6. **Concordances**: A concordance is an alphabetical topical index of Bible passages. You may have one in the back of your Bible. Look up the topic of your passage to find parallel verses. You can find three great concordances here: http://www.biblestudytools.com/concordances/.
- 7. **Discuss it with others**: Share observations and questions with other believers (3D's). How do others understand this passage? What can you learn from their questions and answers?
- 8. **Commentaries/Bible Atlas/Bible dictionary**: These are very helpful in providing background to the geography, history, and culture of biblical times (particularly for harder passages)

OUTLINE IT: PRAY, SUMMARIZE, SYNTHESIZE

Ways to Write Out What You Are Learning - What is the Main Idea/Truth?

Now you're ready to clarify what you've learned about God and yourself in this passage. You've taken it apart; now put it back together. Choose from these helpful ways to **synthesize** what you've just read.

- 1. Outline the text; capture the specific flow of the argument or story.
- 2. Write the passage in your own words. Make sure to capture the main idea.
- 3. Illustrate, draw, paint, what is happening in the passage.
- 4. Journal about what stood out to you in the passage, and pray through it.
- 5. Diagram or flowchart the key concepts in the text.

WHAT DIFFERENCE DOES IT MAKE? PRAY, APPLY, TRANSFORM

Obey God's Word in Your Life Today - How Do I Respond?

Knowing God in His word is a core piece of your life-changing relationship with Him. It is crucial to stop and decide to respond to God in obedience. He loves you. You can trust Him, believe in Him, and obey Him.



1. What am I to believe? – Did I learn something new about God or myself? Is there any important teaching on which I need to build my faith? Is there truth to understand about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, grace, mercy, sin, forgiveness, hope, eternal life, suffering etc.?

Remember the Gospel: How is this passage good news to me because of Jesus?

2. What am I to do? – How does my faith translate into specific action? Is there something I am compelled to do? Is there sin I must confess to God or someone in my life? To confess sin, go below surface actions to the "why" motivation. How does the gospel offer what my sinful motivation does not provide? How does Jesus motivate my faith to obey in specific action?

Remember the Gospel: How did Jesus do all I did not, forgive me, and empower me to obey?

3. *Whom can I tell?* - Is there a person who knows Christ who can help me obey? Is there someone (Christian or not) who might be encouraged, challenged, or resonate with this truth? Does this passage create questions or doubts I can investigate with other believers?

Remember the Gospel: How does God's grace to me in Christ spill over to others?





SCRIPTURE

Begin reading a passage in the bible (if reading the bible is new for you, start in one of the gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, John). Stop when something jumps out.

Take a moment to rephrase or summarize what has jumped out to you. What is God saying in this? Write it down. Consider why God brought this section/idea/word to your attention. Write these reflections down.

OBSERVE

- 1. What words, themes, or phrases stick out?
- 2. Does the passage present a specific command or promise?
- 3. What questions does the passage raise for you?
- 4. What is the surrounding context of the passage, how does it impact what you have read?
- 5. Summarize, in a sentence or two, the main idea/principle of the passage.

APPLY

- 1. How does the passage connect with your life right now?
- 2. Does this prompt you to <u>believe</u> something you didn't before? Is God prompting you <u>to do</u> (or <u>not do</u>) something you weren't doing before? Is God prompting you <u>to share</u> something you haven't shared before?
- 3. Write, specifically, a way to obey God in response to what you just read.

PRAY

Now talk to God. Praise Him for who He is. Confess where you fall short. Ask for further clarity, guidance and understanding of the passage. Talk transparently with Him about any frustrations, fears, doubt, or confusion. Ask Him for the power to respond and obey. Thank Him for Jesus, His forgiveness and His love, that is your motivation to obey.

COMPREHENSION: "WHAT DOES IT SAY?"

- Read the passage repetitively (consider reading multiple translations).
- Look up key words in the dictionary.
- Write a main idea (or draw a summarizing picture) for the passage.
- Note any literary techniques that the author is using.
- Pay attention to genre, conjunctions, syntax, etc.
- Look for repeated ideas, connected ideas, progressions of thought, and mark them.
- What does the passage teach is true about God or us?

INTERPRETATION: "WHAT DOES IT MEAN?"

- What words, themes, or phrases stick out?
- Explore why the author would have used a particular word or phrase, or why he would have made a particular point the way it is made.
- Keep in mind the textual, historical and cultural context.
- Make connections to other parts of the book or Bible (cross references).
- Paraphrase or summarize part or all of the passage.

APPLICATION: "HOW SHOULD THIS CHANGE ME?"

Consider how what the passage teaches about God should change the way you think, speak or act. Make meaningful connections to your own life:

- Is there a sin to confess?
- Is there cause for thanksgiving or praise to God?
- Is there a promise or truth to trust in?
- Is there an attitude to change or a motive to examine?
- Is there a command to obey, or an example to imitate?
- Is there an error to confront or avoid?
- Who can I tell about this truth or change?
- To whom is this good news





READ

Open your Bible and ask God to meet you, and for the Holy Spirit to teach, correct, and train you (2 Timothy 3:16). As you're reading, ask these questions:

- 1. What is happening in this passage? What is the context of this passage?
- 2. What is emphasized, repeated, related?
- 3. What do you learn about who God is? What do you see about who we are?

EXAMINE

Spend some time reflecting. Ask yourself these questions, and write down your thoughts:

- 1. What is the main idea of this passage?
- 2. How do you think God (and the author) wants us to respond?
- 3. Is there something that brings you joy or concern?
- 4. How does this shape what I believe is true about my life, the world, who God is?

APPLY

After examining the passage, apply this to your own life. Ask yourself these questions in order to apply it:

- 1. How do I need to repent: Is there a lie I need to turn from toward this truth or promise? Is there something I need to do or not do in order turn towards God?
- 2. Is there a sin I need to confess to God and/or someone else?
- 3. Is there a relationship that I need to change or reconcile?
- 4. Is there someone I need to share this with?

PRAY

Pray through the passage and your application, asking God to change your heart and to change your life, based on the time you've spent in God's Word. Thank Him for Jesus and His forgiveness and love. Thank Him for the Holy Spirit, and ask for His power to change you and help you obey.





RECEIVE

"Receive" from God's word. Take a few minutes to read a chapter in the bible (if you don't know where to start, try the Gospel of Mark). Note important words, themes, and His train of thought. Stop reading when something jumps out to you. Write it down. No need to read any further. Take a moment to rephrase or summarize what has jumped out to you, and then consider why.

REPENT & REJOICE

"Repent" Sometimes the truth you've just written will highlight something in your life that is in contrast to who God is, or what God wants. What have you done, or said, or thought, or felt, or not done, or done in order to make God owe you, or hidden, or boasted about, or ______ that is not pleasing to your Father. Be honest and specific. Ask Him for forgiveness. Ask for help to turn from (repent) these things towards Him.

Now, **Rejoice!** Yes, right now though nothing is actively different, rejoice! Rejoice and thank God for His forgiveness and grace, freely given to you in Jesus. Tell Him how grateful you are for His mercy. He loves you like His very own son or daughter.

RESPOND

"Respond" Decide how you are to obey by living in response to and in step with God.

- 1. <u>What am I to believe?</u> Did I learn something about God or myself? Is there a truth to cling to? How is this passage good news to me because of Jesus?
- 2. <u>What am I to do?</u> How does my faith compel a specific action? Is there something I am to do? Is there sin I must not do, or confess to God and a friend? How does Jesus do all I did not, forgive me, and empower me to obey?
- 3. <u>Whom can I tell?</u> Is there a person who knows Christ who can help me obey? Is there someone (Christian or not) who might be encouraged, challenged, or resonate with this truth? How does God's grace to me in Jesus spill over to others?



Identify & Develop New Leaders

OVERVIEW

Identifying new leaders is not just finding people are already leaders, but being able to see potential leadership in someone. Leadership development is discipling someone into a leadership role. This takes time and wisdom. Here is a strategy to help you do this.

WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FOR? FAT

- 1. **Faithful** Who is the person(s) in your group that regularly attend family gathering, scatter times, and 3D? Do they regularly attend on Sunday? Are they a part of a service team? As a CG leader you are looking for people who are committed to The Well and the community group. These are the people that make "Following Jesus Together" a priority. Keep in mind you are not looking for perfection, but for faithfulness.
- 2. **Available** Who has space in there to spend time being developed? Most people think they do not have space, but most do. Help them to see that they are already committed and developing is a part of growing in Christ. Tell them what you see in them as a potential leader.
- 3. **Teachable** Does this person(s) have a teachable attitude? Simply put, will they receive direction and feedback. Part of developing leaders is giving them direct input and asking them to watch you lead.

3 PHASES OF LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

- 1. Phase 1 "Start Small" Developing leaders/co-leaders must be intentional and specific. Rather than asking them to be a co-leader, ask them to host Family Gathering or take point on service project. In phase 1 they are being developed and don't even know it. This is great place access if they are FAT. Give a person a small task, provide direction/support, and give feedback after. (2-3 months)
- 2. Phase 2 "Making the Ask" After someone has been faithful, available, and teachable in Phase 1, ask them to be a co-leader. Many people say no even though they have been co-leading the whole time in phase 1. This phase looks like phase 1 on the outside as the same type of tasks are being done, but the feedback is more intentional and what you are developing them toward is specific. Help them see that they are already doing it. Be specific with a timeline (2-3 months). Point out the things they are doing well and why you value them as co-leader. Give them 2 weeks to think about it and follow up on the decision.
- 3. Phase 3 "Develop and Launch" In the final phase of leadership development you focus on sending. This requires an intentional plan to launch someone as a new CG leader. Set a timeline and specific steps. Your CG Coach can help you. The Launching a CG Guide will also provide actionable steps.



Coach Job Description

GOSPEL

Community Group Coaching is discipleship. As Christ poured His life into a few, so we follow Him and pour our lives into a few. As we disciple these leaders, we model and equip them to do the same with their Community Group. Cf. Matthew 28.18-20; 2 Timothy 2.1-2, Matthew 4.19-20

ROLE

- 1. Pastor and Disciple designated group leaders (spouses if desired).
- 2. Provide strategic support and accountability for effective CG leadership.
- 3. Walk with CG Leader through deeper pastoral situations.

EXPECTATIONS

- 1. Pastoral Discipleship: Meet 1x a month in person. Connect 1x a month on the phone/email/text. Attend every other month CG Leader Dinner (Sat 5pm). Attend every other month CG Leader Training (11:15am).
- 2. Strategic Feedback- Use coaching questions to determine health of the group/leadership. Encourage Preaching Series Curriculums and training other provided materials. Give monthly updates to Communities Pastor (1x Month 10n1 Meeting).
- 3. Surface pastoral situations and respond with presence, coaching, prayer, scripture, and resourcing to guide the leader through healthy pastoral care and equipping of their group/member.



CG Coaching Questions

OVERVIEW

These questions will help diagnose the health of the Leader and their Community Group. As you go through the "Basic Coaching Questions" focus in where necessary. Follow the Spirit towards areas to support, encourage, challenge (etc.) by asking follow up questions around a given value or rhythm ("Rhythm+Values Questions"). Stop often to PRAY and seek the scriptures together.

BASIC COACHING QUESTIONS

1. How are you doing?

a. Beginning with this question sets a tone of relationship and care, rather than simply getting down to business. Make sure you hear about their relationship with Jesus, family, work, and the lost.

2. What are you celebrating?

a. Listening to the answer to this question will help you encourage this leader. Celebrate with them! Most likely your leader feels beat down. You are here to lift them up. What they are celebrating will also reveal what they value. So be aware of blind spots to other integral areas in the group which may not be their focus.

3. What challenges are you facing?

a. Where sinners gather, there are always challenges. If there isn't a response to this, or they are consistently shallow challenges, it is likely the group isn't pursuing the vision particularly well. "Struggles" may also reveal misplaced values within the CG. If "dealing with children" is consistently a challenge, it might be their desire for a tight meeting is devaluing the opportunity to disciple the children of the community together.

4. What are you doing about those challenges?

a. This question is vital because you first want the leader to address the challenges on their own and present creative solutions before the coach chimes in. Ownership is critical. Ask them to pray now together for wisdom in it. Bring them to Christ and the Holy Spirit's leading. Then follow up with: How Can I Help? Brainstorm together, seek God together.

VALUES & RHYTHMS QUESTIONS

Family Gathering – Live for Christ Together

- 1. How often are you having a Family Gathering (monthly)?
- 2. What did your last Family Gathering look like?
- 3. Are you using the Family Gathering Guide to help this aspect of your group?



- 4. How many people regularly attend your family gathering?
- 5. Are people sharing how Jesus is working in their life and moving through them into the lives of others?
- 6. Are you praying for one another and those that don't yet know Christ?
- 7. What did the last time of planning to scatter look like?
- 8. How are you casting vision towards celebration and service?
- 9. Are others sharing leadership by hosting the family gathering, or leading different aspects of the night?

Health: The CG is meeting regularly (at least monthly) to remember that CG is about Jesus. They are doing so by sharing stories about His work in their lives, and sharing stories about people they desire to know Christ. The CG is also praying to know Jesus more and make Him known. They then plan ways they will scatter together to build relationship with (celebrate) and bless (serve) those who don't yet know Christ.

Scattering Together- Demonstrate and Declare the Gospel

- 1. How many times in the last two months has your community planned and executed a scatter time together?
- 2. Are you using the Scattering Guides to help this aspect of your group?
- 3. Have members of your CG planned impromptu scattered times where not everyone need attend? Ex. Happy Hour, game night, running group, etc.
- 4. How did your last celebration scatter go? Did people invite neighbors, co-workers, and friends (why/why not)? Did they come (why/why not)?
- 5. How did your last service scatter go? Did people invite neighbors, co-workers, and friends (why/why not)? Did they come (why/why not?)
- 6. Are you sharing leadership by asking individuals to lead scatter times (or parts of them)?

Health: The CG is scattering at least monthly to either serve or celebrate amongst the lost. There is a blend of celebration and service. Lost people are being invited to these "events." It's not always a whole group thing, but many are more informal where a few CG members and neighbors/coworkers/friends are intentionally present.

3D- Go Deep in Discipleship with life, bible, and prayer.

- 1. How many people regularly attend your 3D?
- 2. Are you using the 3D Meeting Guide to help this aspect of your group?
- 3. Are people sharing leadership by taking turns facilitating the 3D gathering?
- 4. Are people sharing sin and confessing transparently? Are you growing in friendship, and sharing both joys and struggles together? Do you hang out outside of 3D time?
- 5. What does praying in your 3D look like? Do you pray throughout the meeting as things come up (both to celebrate and seek God for)? Does everyone pray?
- 6. Are you praying for non-believers by name?
- 7. What are your 3D's currently studying in the scriptures? If you are currently doing a book, are you opening the scriptures that the book references together?



Health: The CG/3D meets weekly for deeper times of discipleship by praying, opening the scriptures, and sharing life transparently. "Curriculum" is Christ Centered, and though not always just the bible, the bible is continually and repetitiously opened together. Life is being shared, as sin is confessed, struggles are opened up, and loving friendship is present.

PRAYER & SCRIPTURES

Remember to stop and pray throughout your time together to celebrate God's grace where He is at work, and to seek Him where you or the CG Leader needs guidance. If there are scriptures that connect to things in the conversation, be sure to share them or send them along to the leader later for encouragement, challenge or support. Make sure to end your time talking with God in prayer.



Launching a Community

PHASE 1 - SHARE YOUR STORY

We want to know who you are, how you became a Christian, and where you are passionate and gifted. We want to hear your story. The very first step to launching a community is sitting down with your CG leader, Community Pastor and/or a Community Coach to talk through your walk with Christ. As leaders, we want to set you up for success and this conversation will help develop a plan for leadership at The Well.

PHASE 2 - RECRUIT A CORE TEAM & SHARED LEADERSHIP

Recruiting a core team will be vital to launch to the community group. The core team is a group of people (3 to 6) that is completely bought in to the mission of the group. "Their 'yes' is on the table."

Identify a Core Team

Begin by thinking through the lenses of live, work, and play. Geography is not the only way to launch a community, but it is one of the best places to start. Your coach can help you identify people at The Well.

- 1. Who lives near me? How does this affect my core team?
- 2. Who do I work with? Does work need to be a factor in my core team?
- 3. Who do I spend recreational time with? What people do you like to hang out with?

Make the Ask

As a leader it is your responsibility to get people on board. Ask your potential core team to dinner, to coffee, or go someplace you can talk. Clearly articulate your mission and vision for the community.

Ask Specific Questions

- 1. Will you be on my core team as we live this mission together?
- 2. Do you have thoughts or ideas to improve the mission and vision?
- 3. Will you be a co-leader with me?

OVERVIEW

Don't expect people to answer you on the spot. Tell them to take a week and think about it. Continue the dialogue with them. Share the scriptures and Jeff Vanderstelt article from Phase 3 with them.



PHASE 3 - DEFINE THE MISSION

In one sense every Community Group has the same mission, following Jesus together for the good of the world. But how is your group going to do that? In order to move toward this purpose, we need to get specific.

Work through these questions

- 1. Who lives around me? (God has sovereignly placed you where you are.)
- 2. How do the people I work with fit into my vision?
- 3. Where do you spend your free time?

Spend Time Praying and Reading the Scripture

- 1. Ask God to give you wisdom and clarity for your vision
- 2. Reading through these passages in Acts 1:12-14; 2:42-47; 4:32-37
- 3. Review The Well Community Values & the corresponding scriptures
- 4. Read "What is a Missional Community" by Jeff Vanderstelt

Write Down Your Community Group Mission

Write down your community mission. This will help you gain clarity and

give you a good foundation when you begin to recruit a core team. Share your mission with the Community Pastor or Community Coach. They will give you feedback and help shape your group.

PHASE 4 - LAUNCH THE COMMUNITY PRIMER

At this point you would be receiving regular coaching and your community is ready for launch.

Set a launch date – Find a day and time that the core team can gather for meals for the next 7 weeks as you go through the Community Primer together. As you walk through The Primer your community will grow in the values and practices of community.



Connecting New People

OVERVIEW

Helping people connect into your community group is a vital part of leading a CG. Many people at The Well connect through the formal process. They fill out a connection card, receive follow up from the staff, and get introduced to a community leader. It is also important for CG leaders to talk with new people on Sunday. If you see a new face, ask that person to sit with you, see where they live, and introduce them to the right person.

BEING A CONNECTOR

- 1. **Modeling** As a leader you set the tone for welcoming new people into your group. You can model this by spending time with a new person during the family gathering or scatter time. Ask them questions with a genuine desire to get to know the person.
- 2. **Teaching** It is easy for all of us to gravitate to people we already know. This is not a bad thing, it's a natural thing. We are designed for community and want to have that connection. As a leader, you must always remind people that part of being in community group is moving toward new people.
- 3. **Delegating** You will often know a new person will be attending a CG event before the rest of the community. Identify a friendly and welcoming person in your community and ask them to engage the visitor.
- 4. **Follow Up** Contact each new visitor within 48 hours after they attend a CG event. A text or phone call is great. Tell them you are glad they came, ask them how they enjoyed the event, see if they have any questions, and let them know you are looking forward to seeing them at the next CG event

BARRIERS TO CONNECTING

- 1. **Informational Barrier –** People simply do not know how to connect and where to connect.
- 2. **Relational Barrier** People do not know who to connect with. It's difficult for many people to walk into a room full of people and start engaging in conversation.

OVERCOMING THE BARRIERS

1. **Informational Barrier** – Make sure new visitors have all the information they need. Send an email with the date, time, location, and provide a brief description of the community event. Ask them if they have any questions and let them know they can reach out to you. Make sure they have all your contact information.



2. **Relational Barrier** – Follow up is key. Let newcomers know what service you and other members of the CG attend. Ask someone in the CG to follow up with them. It is always great to grab coffee or lunch after a Sunday gathering. Engaging with people outside of normal community rhythm helps people to feel valued.

CREATING A "STICKY" GROUP

As you model, teach, and delegate connecting to your community group it becomes natural. It starts to be a piece of the group DNA. Groups that naturally do these things become "sticky." People want to stick in the group because they feel welcome and wanted. These groups tend to grow and retain more people because the CG members are actually engaging each other in conversation. They talk and gather outside of regularly planned community rhythms. The CG's actually have genuine community and people want that. They want to stick with it so they can develop the same friendship that they see.



Community Primer | Introduction

WHAT IS IT

We have seen how God uses Community Groups to transform lives and communities in Silver Spring and the surrounding area. We are so excited for what God has in store for you and your Community Group. You are entering into something exciting!

This Community Primer is designed to help your Community Group begin. This will walk you through the CG values, help your group get to know each other better, and familiarize you with various resources that will help your CG grow.

HOW TO USE IT

Each Primer consists of a value, Scripture reading and discussion questions, engagement next steps, and prayer. Go section by section, read what's there, and discuss the questions. During your next meeting, start your gathering by following up on the previous meeting's engage action point.

First, watch this video from SOMA and dream a bit about what God could do in your group.

- 1. What gripped you from that video?
- 2. What frightens or excites you about this kind of community?



Community Primer | Week 1

FOLLOWING JESUS

Read together

We are explicitly Christ-centered, worshiping God by orienting our entire lives around Him. Our Triune God has revealed Himself to us in His Son, Jesus Christ. The gospel has changed every bit of our lives and we live for Him. The gospel both saves and sanctifies us. Christ is our Savior, example, and provision for a relationship with God and our lives of obedience to Him in His world. The Christ Centered scriptures reveal our God and shape our relationship with Him through the empowerment of the Spirit. The gospel shapes everything we do and all that we are about.

This is primarily lived out in the Community Group Family Meal, where the CG shares about how Jesus is at work in each member's life and how He is working in the lives of people around us.

Life Question – When did Jesus become central in your life? How is His centrality shaping the different areas of your life today (i.e., work, parenting, etc.)? Is there anything competing for centrality in your life?

SCRIPTURE & DISCUSSION

Read together

I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me.

Galatians 2:20 (ESV)

And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." Matthew 4:19 (ESV)

- 1. What are some key words or phrases that stand out in these verses?
- 2. What does it look like to fully orient our lives around God? To be fully Christ-centered according to these passages?
- 3. Describe your relationship with Jesus. Are you getting to know Him and shaped by the Spirit as you read His word? Why or why not?



4. What role does your Community Group play in your own pursuit of following Jesus? What role do you play in your Community Group's pursuit of following Jesus?

Main Idea – Jesus is central in our personal and Community Group life.

Main Goal – We would each have a vibrant relationship with Jesus that transforms our personal lives. Our Community Group meal would remind us of Christ's centrality as we share stories.

ENGAGE - PERSONAL TIME WITH THE LORD

One of the best ways we can follow Jesus is through consistent time with Him. Use the ACTS prayer model and either the GROW or SOAP scripture reading models to spend regular time with the Lord over the next week. As you consistently do this, it will turn into a regular habit. Be prepared to share next week how this went. You can find those resources in the appendix.

PRAY

Read over the Family Meal document and discuss the different components. Once you finish the primer, we suggest you hold a family meal monthly (or more).

Pray that God would shape us into a community that loves God and seeks to be fully centered on Him. Pray that God would shape us into a community that loves Christ and is shaped into his likeness by scripture. Pray that God would reveal Jesus to others through us.



Family Meal Connecting with Your Family on Mission

THE BASICS

Acts 2:42-47

We gather together as a family to share our lives around the table and plan to move together toward others in our neighborhood, including neighbors, coworkers, and friends. Family Gatherings should happen at least once a month on a regular day and time. Anyone in your Community Group can host, so try rotating locations. Create a hospitable environment – nothing fancy!

THE STRUCTURE

Family Gatherings should have three main components during each gathering:

- 1. **Mingle and Chat** (15 min) Give people time to chat informally. This is a great time to check in with people and finish setting up food.
- 2. **Meal** (45 min) Food is not just a tool to entice people to come. When you share your lives around a table, communities grow as you laugh and cry about real life moments. Try a potluck style, or have the host or leader plan the menu and then send an email to the group about what everyone can sign up to bring.

Ask the following questions while sharing a meal:

- 1. How is Jesus working in your life?
- 2. How is Jesus causing you to move toward others?
- 3. **Plan** (30 min) Intentionally make time to incorporate your lives together. Bring your calendars and plan Scatter Times. The responsibility for Scatter Times falls on each community member. The leader does not have to coordinate or attend every single one. Many times the entire group will not be able to attend. For example, if someone expresses interest in serving, ask them to plan a serving activity for the group.
- 4. **Pray** (30 min) Spend time in prayer specifically for each other. Pray that God would use your community to demonstrate and declare the gospel, and that neighbors, co-workers, and friends would come to know him. Instead of waiting until the end to pray, try to pray throughout your time together as people share around the table.



Community Primer | Week 2

FOLLOW UP:

Have everyone share how they did with last week's action point, which was to regularly study God's word using the SOAP or GROW model, as well as regularly praying with ACTS.

TOGETHER

Read together

We live our lives together as disciples of Christ in a diverse, unified, community of believers. We go deep in discipleship with one another by seeking Him in the scriptures and in prayer. We share our lives transparently together, that the real "me" would be known, loved, and embraced in real time. We give to each other sacrificially and generously. Programs and structures help foster these "family relationships," helping us integrate all our lives, knitting together our "church friends" with neighbors, coworkers, and friends.

This primarily happens in our weekly 3D times as we share our lives transparently, read the scriptures together, and pray for one another.

Life Question – What's the best community relationships you've experienced? Share examples. What do you hope or long for from this relational community? What are you frightened of?

SCRIPTURE & DISCUSSION

Read together

And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. And awe came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. And all who believed were together and had all things in common. And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need. And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved.

Acts 2:42-47 (ESV)



- 1. What were some key markers of the early church in this passage?
- 2. Is this picture of community in the New Testament different than the way you experience community life and relationships today? Compare and contrast.
- 3. What are the joys of biblical community? What are the challenges and barriers?
- 4. How can we rely on God to develop community within this group? What practical steps can we take?

Main Idea – We are called to share deep and transparent lives together that shape us into Christlikeness.

Main Goal – We want to become friends and family together in real relationship that happens in and out of group time. We also want the weekly 3D meetings to help you grow deep and transparent.

ENGAGE - SHARE MY STORY

One of the best ways to connect as a group is by sharing our life stories together with each other. Start by everyone sharing their story over the next couple of weeks, using the guidelines on the next page. Eat a meal together (consider sharing hosting responsibilities) and have people share about 15 minutes each. Don't move on to the next primer until everyone has had a chance to share.

PRAY

Once you start meeting in 3Ds, you will structure your time around life, bible, and prayer. Look over the 3D meeting guide, found in the appendix, and pray that God would exceed your expectation with our relationship together, and for the people he is going to bring into this community. Pray that we would grow in our love for one another.





OVERVIEW

We desire to be impacted by and tell the story of how God has transformed our lives through the gospel. In preparing to share this story, it's helpful to reflect upon and write it out in your own words. Take time to seek the Lord in order to reflect and remember your story. The outside of our lives ("what" we say and do) gives us a window into the "why" (condition of our hearts). Our grave situation highlights our Great Savior, creating our joy! He is rich in mercy, love and grace.

Spend the next few weekly family meals for everyone in your group to share his or her story.

Community Primer | Week 3

FOR THE GOOD OF THE WORLD

Read together

You've enjoyed a lot of meals and shared a lot of stories, but it's easy to forget that there are a lot of people who do not experience meals and community like this, especially communities that are transformed and shaped by Christ.

We are sent by God to see Him redeem people and bring about the restoration of His world. God has rescued us by grace through faith in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. We want the world to know and embrace Him. Mission catalyzes our decision-making and spending. We want to demonstrate the gospel by caring for the "least of these." We want to declare the gospel by explicitly sharing with "the lost." We pray and live in a way that God might multiply His Kingdom through us at every level: individual disciples, CGs, and churches.

This primarily happens in the CG Scattered Times when we build relationships and share the gospel by celebrating and serving with and amongst the lost.

Life question – Name some people you love that don't know Jesus. Think through your neighbors, coworkers, friends, and family. Share a bit about them. What are they looking for that they'd only find in Jesus? How might Jesus bring new purpose to their lives?

SCRIPTURE & DISCUSSION

Read together

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Matthew 28:18-20 (ESV)

But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

Jeremiah 29:7 (ESV)

- 1. What stands out to you from these passages?
- 2. Why do you think God uses us to make disciples?



- 3. What role do we play? What role does God play?
- 4. How can we reorient our lives to follow Jesus together as a community on mission?
- 5. What are some ways we can celebrate (enjoy relationship) with our neighbors, coworkers, and friends who don't yet know Christ? Reference the celebration portion of the scatter resource in the appendix.
- 6. What are some ways we can serve and serve with our lost neighbors, coworkers, and friends? Reference the serve portion of the scatter resource in the appendix.
- 7. If your group had \$1000 in each of your hands, what would you do with it to celebrate or serve those who don't yet know Christ?

ENGAGE - TO WHOM, HOW?

Have everyone go to the To Whom How document in the appendix. Fill out the Place section and then share your thoughts. Fill out the Go Deeper section and share your thoughts.

PRAY

Pray that the Holy Spirit would captivate our lives with the love of Jesus and as a result we would see all of life as mission. Pray for specific people by name. Ask God to give you opportunities to declare the gospel and that he would save them. Pray for wisdom and boldness for your Community Group as you seek to reach your neighbors, coworkers, and friends.



Community Primer | Week 4

FOLLOWING JESUS TOGETHER FOR THE GOOD OF THE WORLD

We have spent the past couple of weeks looking through our Community Group values. As a reminder, they are Following Jesus Together for the Good of the World. We are "Jesus centered," both personally and together as a group. We do this "together" by sharing our lives transparently, studying scripture, and praying with one another. And we do all of this "for the good of the world" so that our neighbors, coworkers, friends, and family have opportunities to hear about Jesus.

This is lived out through:

- 1. Family Meal
- 2. 3D's
- 3. Scatter Times

After living these rhythms over the next six months, regroup and think about how your group would best contextualize these values around who your group is and how best to reach your neighbors, coworkers, friends, and family. Each group is different, so consider the unique personalities, life situations, and contexts of your group.

Now that you have a basic overview of community values, rhythms, and the foundation in the scripture, it is time to put this knowledge into action.

- 1. Spend time praying together and ask God to give you unity as a community on mission.
- 2. Work through the questions below and write down the answers as a group.

MISSION

Write out the primary mission of your community group.

How would you capture, in a sentence or two, what you are about and who you hope to reach with the gospel?

FAMILY GATHERING

What day(s) and time of the week will your Family Gathering take place? *Set a repetitious gathering. Example: Every other Sunday at 5:00PM* (Minimum monthly)

Who will host family gatherings? How will we share hosting as a group?



How will our group communicate with each other for meal sign up and relational opportunities throughout the week? (Email, text, GroupMe, etc.)

SCATTERING TOGETHER

Plan the first Community Group Scatter

- 1. Will it be a celebration or service?
- 2. What day and time will it be?
- 3. Who will take point on planning it?
- 4. Which neighbors, co-workers, and friends do you need to invite? *List them by name and spend time praying for each one of them before moving on.*
- 5. Prior to the scatter time, everyone invite the people they're going to invite.

3D

Who will be the women's 3D leader? What day and time of the week will you meet? Where will you meet?

Who will be the men's 3D leader? What day and time of the week will you meet? Where will you meet?

ACTS - ENJOYING & ENGAGING GOD IN PRAYER

Prayerfully linger in these areas (10-15min each)

- Adoration (praising God for who He is)
 - What have you learned about His character lately? Praise Him
 - What ways has God been ______ to you? Praise Him.
 - Where do you need God to be who He is in your life? Praise Him.
 - Read through the Psalms if necessary as a guide to help you praise Him.
- Confession (things done, not done, motives etc.)

 - What do you need to confess to Him in your work?

GET IN IT: PRAY, REFLECT, OBSERVE

Read + Observe Everything Within the Passage - What Does it Say?

- 1. Before you start reading spend time **being still**. Ask God to show you what's on your heart and mind. Prayerfully ask Him for a desire to know and love Him more. Ask Him to meet you in this time with Him in the Bible and to change you to be more like His Son.
- 2. **Read the passage** a few times and carefully observe the words; give full attention to what it says. The purpose of *observation* is to saturate yourself completely with the content of the passage. Look for things such as: important words (what's being talked about), conjunctions (how is one idea connected to another), admonitions (something being commanded), contrasts, comparisons, illustrations, repeated phrases/words, mood, and grammatical construction (verb tenses, prepositional phrases, etc.). Linger here, listening to what God is saying in the detail of His words.
- 3. **Ask questions**. This is the bridge between *reading* the passage and *understanding* it. Don't rush this step (even if think you know the answers). Ask yourself many *questions for understanding* such as: Who is writing? Who are the characters? What's the meaning of...? I wonder why...? What's the relationship between...? What is written before and after the passage (context is everything)? What is unexpected in this passage? What rubs me wrong about this passage? How does this fit into the grand story of the scriptures (Creation, Fall, Redemption, Culmination)? What do I learn about myself from this passage? What do I learn about God in this passage? What is the definition of...? Etc.

RESOURCES: PRAY, INTERPRET, ANSWER

Tools to Help You Answer Your Questions - What Does it Mean?

The goal here is to use resources to help unleash the meaning. You want to be careful not to bring your own assumptions, perspectives, thoughts, background, and experiences to the text. Though our experiences are helpful, presuppositions can also result in an incorrect, shallow, or unbiblical meaning. Interpreting the passage flows out of your previous questions for understanding (above). Use some of these tools below to help you. Aim to discover the author's purpose in writing.

1. Use the passage and surrounding context: Look before, after, and in your passage to answer as many questions for understanding as possible. Allow scripture to interpret scripture. Context is everything.



- 2. Pray. Reading the Bible is your conversation with God. Remember to keep talking with Him. Ask Him for clarity and answers; wrestle with Him over hard truths. Confess, rejoice, seek Him.
- 3. **Define words**: Look in a dictionary to discover the meaning of key words.
- 4. Compare translations: Read the passage in several translations to hear it afresh.
- 5. Study cross-references: Use the footnotes to find similar verses. We recommend the ESV Study Bible.
- 6. Concordances: A concordance is an alphabetical topical index of Bible passages. You may have one in the back of your Bible. Look up the topic of your passage to find parallel verses. You can find three great concordances here: http://www.biblestudytools.com/concordances/.
- 7. **Discuss it with others**: Share observations and questions with other believers (3D's). How do others understand this passage? What can you learn from their questions and answers?
- 8. Commentaries/Bible Atlas/Bible dictionary: These are very helpful in providing background to the geography, history, and culture of biblical times (particularly for harder passages)

OUTLINE IT: PRAY, SUMMARIZE, SYNTHESIZE

Ways to Write Out What You Are Learning - What is the Main Idea/Truth?

Now you're ready to clarify what you've learned about God and yourself in this passage. You've taken it apart; now put it back together. Choose from these helpful ways to **synthesize** what you've just read.

- 1. Outline the text; capture the specific flow of the argument or story.
- 2. Write the passage in your own words. Make sure to capture the main idea.
- 3. Illustrate, draw, paint, what is happening in the passage.
- 4. Journal about what stood out to you in the passage, and pray through it.
- 5. Diagram or flowchart the key concepts in the text.

WHAT DIFFERENCE DOES IT MAKE? PRAY, APPLY, TRANSFORM

Obey God's Word in Your Life Today - How Do I Respond?

Knowing God in His word is a core piece of your life-changing relationship with Him. It is crucial to stop and decide to respond to God in obedience. He loves you. You can trust Him, believe in Him, and obey Him.



1. What am I to believe? – Did I learn something new about God or myself? Is there any important teaching on which I need to build my faith? Is there truth to understand about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, grace, mercy, sin, forgiveness, hope, eternal life, suffering etc.?

Remember the Gospel: How is this passage good news to me because of Jesus?

2. What am I to do? – How does my faith translate into specific action? Is there something I am compelled to do? Is there sin I must confess to God or someone in my life? To confess sin, go below surface actions to the "why" motivation. How does the gospel offer what my sinful motivation does not provide? How does Jesus motivate my faith to obey in specific action?

Remember the Gospel: How did Jesus do all I did not, forgive me, and empower me to obey?

3. Whom can I tell? - Is there a person who knows Christ who can help me obey? Is there someone (Christian or not) who might be encouraged, challenged, or resonate with this truth? Does this passage create questions or doubts I can investigate with other believers?

Remember the Gospel: How does God's grace to me in Christ spill over to others?





SCRIPTURE

Begin reading a passage in the bible (if reading the bible is new for you, start in one of the gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, John). Stop when something jumps out.

Take a moment to rephrase or summarize what has jumped out to you. What is God saying in this? Write it down. Consider why God brought this section/idea/word to your attention. Write these reflections down.

OBSERVE

- 1. What words, themes, or phrases stick out?
- 2. Does the passage present a specific command or promise?
- 3. What questions does the passage raise for you?
- 4. What is the surrounding context of the passage, how does it impact what you have read?
- 5. Summarize, in a sentence or two, the main idea/principle of the passage.

APPLY

- 1. How does the passage connect with your life right now?
- 2. Does this prompt you to <u>believe</u> something you didn't before? Is God prompting you <u>to do</u> (or <u>not do</u>) something you weren't doing before? Is God prompting you <u>to share</u> something you haven't shared before?
- 3. Write, specifically, a way to obey God in response to what you just read.

PRAY

Now talk to God. Praise Him for who He is. Confess where you fall short. Ask for further clarity, guidance and understanding of the passage. Talk transparently with Him about any frustrations, fears, doubt, or confusion. Ask Him for the power to respond and obey. Thank Him for Jesus, His forgiveness and His love, that is your motivation to obey.



3D Meeting Guide

BIBLE (30 MIN)

Read and discuss a chapter (or less) of the bible together. Use the below two main questions to guide your discussion. Share what you learned in this passage as you read it on your own through the week, or as you read it together now (use the GROW tool or any of our other bible study guides found online for your personal study through the week). Jump in and out of prayer as you seek God together.

- 1. What does it say? Reflect and observe what God says in this passage. Consider words, themes, commands, promises, etc. Simply share all of the things that jump out to you about this passage.
- 2. What does it mean? Consider the context, commentaries, flow of thought, argument, and other passages of scripture to summarize the meaning. Summarize the main idea/principle of the passage.
- 3. How does the gospel inform or connect with this truth, highlighting God's provision to us in Christ, and compelling us to obey Him because of His grace?

LIFE (30 MIN)

Now focus on how the passage you read impacts your life. What difference does what you have just read/shared make in your life? So what?

Consider how God desires you to respond to who He is and what He has said. Be specific, tangible, real, honest, transparent. What is God calling you to do, not do, believe, confess, or share? Do not forget the gospel! Jesus has given you His righteousness. Jesus has forgiven you for your sin. His grace and acceptance compels us to obey.

Here are some questions to help facilitate deeper discussion:

- 1. What must you do (not do), or believe in light of what we have just read?
- 2. Is there something you need to celebrate or confess from the past week?
- 3. Who could you share this truth with (both a believer and non-believer)?
- 4. See supplementary questions on the bottom of this sheet.



PRAYER (15 MIN)

Spend time talking to God and praying for each other. Pray through any areas God has spoken to you through the given passage. Consider the following:

- 1. Praise God for who He is.
- 2. Confess sins, disobedience, or disbelief.
- 3. Thank God for His grace and provision.
- 4. Pray for people who don't yet know Him, by name.

SUPPLEMENTARY LIFE QUESTIONS

Below are some additional questions that we have found helpful for sharing our life together. Choose any that apply to the passage, or may spur conversation:

- 1. What am I to believe?
 - a. What do you doubt?
 - b. What is keeping me from trusting in God?
 - c. How has the Holy Spirit been growing your faith this week?
 - d. What unhealthy thoughts have been lingering in your mind?
 - e. Is there a promise you need to claim?
- 2. What am I to do?
 - a. How have you been disobedient to God this week? Something you have said, done, thought, looked at?
 - b. Have you avoided a step of obedience God wants you to take?
 - c. Are your relationships healthy and honoring to God? How has your love for others been incomplete? Is there someone with whom you need to reconcile, or share loving truth with?
 - d. Are you being sacrificial and generous with your love?
- 3. Whom can I tell?
 - a. Who is someone that does not yet know Jesus, that you sense God is moving you towards?
 - b. What is the next step towards them that you need to take?
 - c. What question could you ask a coworker, neighbor, friend, or family member that might spur deeper conversation?





Building Relationships with Gospel Intentionality

THE BASICS

Look at all of your life intentionally as a missionary. We scatter together to live our lives on mission, to demonstrate and declare the gospel. Instead of adding more events to packed calendars, look at the natural rhythms of your life. Scatter Times offer a neutral and natural environment for anyone to feel comfortable to join, especially when you invite people to participate in activities they would do anyways. We suggest scattering together 2-3 times per month.

KEY RHYTHMS

Scatter Times typically fall under two key phrases:

- 1. Celebrate Throw or join a party to celebrate a holiday, birthday, or anniversary. Or just celebrate life with a cookout on Friday and invite neighbors, coworkers, and friends. The goal of celebrations is to build genuine relationships with the hope of engaging in explicit gospel conversations.
 - This looks different depending on your life stage. For example, if one of your coworkers wants to play trivia or join a running group, invite a small pocket of your community to join you. Or, maybe you want to put your kid in soccer. Invite other community parents to put their kids in the same soccer league, and engage with parents on the sidelines during practices and games.
- 2. Serve Demonstrate the gospel by meeting felt and tangible needs, including emotional and physical needs of people around you. Invite neighbors, coworkers, and friends to serve alongside your community and to love the city together. Don't feel like you have to create events from scratch. Join a community project or serve alongside a non-profit in your neighborhood. And when people ask why you serve, take the opportunity to share the gospel. (We can serve and give of ourselves because Jesus has sacrificed so much for us and loved us.)

NUTS & BOLTS

- Be intentional about what's on your calendar. It doesn't always have to be additional.
- Ask people to bring their calendars to Family Gatherings and plan dates together.
- Consider the season of the year. Be proactive to connect with people around holidays, in the warm weather, or at seasonal events.

What are you reading? I need your advice on _____. How do you relax? What do you think about your boss? Do you pray, about what? What do you think happens when you die? Who/what has shaped your view of Jesus? What questions would you ask God if you could? What do you think about the bible? What is your spiritual history like? Could we read something out of the bible together? Why do you work where you do? What is bringing you joy these days? What's something you wish you could change?

THE GOSPEL: "GOOD NEWS"

God saves sinners through faith in Jesus' life/death/resurrection.

- 1. God made us for a life-giving relationship with Him. *Psalm 100:3; Acts 17:24-28*
- 2. We all broke this relationship, desiring to live life our own way. *Isaiah 53:6; Romans 3:23*
- 3. The penalty for breaking this relationship is death now and to come. *Romans 6:23; Isaiah 59:2*
- 4. Jesus paid that penalty for you, taking on God's wrath, rising again. 1 Peter 3:18; Romans 5:8
- 5. Receive Him, begin living/experiencing life in relationship with God. *Jn 1:12, 3:36; Eph 2:8-10*





ABOUT THIS STUDY

It's pretty simple: we can't begin to share the gospel with anyone or live a gospel-centered life until we can know *the gospel* for ourselves. And, even more than just knowing it in our heads, we need to know how to apply it to our lives and then articulate it for real impact and a changed life.

We're going to spend four weeks defining the gospel before we tackle *The Gospel-Centered Life*. To some, this might seem like a repetitive exercise with information that you learned and accepted years ago. But we all need a refresh, a reminder of the roots of our Christian faith before we can stand strong, deeply rooted in our faith. The gospel is not just the ABC's but the A to Z of the Christian life. The gospel is more than just a message for sinners to be saved, but it impacts and transforms every aspect of our lives and world. Let's meet God in his Scriptures.

As you go through this study with your 3D group, feel free to ask any questions that come to mind. Take time to ask the questions that might feel too basic or too obvious. This is the time to work through the basics—the roots—before we can go share the good news with our neighbors, co-workers, friends, and family. Don't be shy!

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

We suggest that you do one lesson each week. At the beginning of each lesson, there's a lesson overview that gives some suggestions on how long you should spend on each section. This is just a guide with rough estimates. Some sections might take your group longer, so don't worry if the discussion is going well and you aren't ready to move on to the next part.

Leaders, use the READ and ASK cues to help transition from reading passages to asking questions for discussion. The italics indicate suggested answers to help guide your discussion. Of course, there are so many more unique ways to answer each question, so please use the italics simply as a starting point.

A TIP TO KEEP IN YOUR BACK POCKET

There's a lot more to the story of the Bible, but you can start with 10 words that you can count on each finger. These 10 words define *the gospel:* "God saved sinners through Jesus Christ's life, death, and resurrection."

Now, let's jump into the meaning of these words, so we'll know exactly what to do with those 10 words that we carry around.



Lesson 1 GOD'S INTENT – GOD SAVES SINNERS

_

BIG IDEA

In order to understand the gospel, we need to start at the beginning. It is important to have a foundational understanding of who God is, what His intention is in creation, and how we are designed for relationship with Him.

Life Question: When is a time you experienced intimacy and joy with the Lord? Where do you see the lack in your relationship with the Lord, or those around you?

BIBLE CONVERSATION // 30 MIN

As we go on a journey starting in Genesis, we see that the beginning of the story started out beautiful. Read Genesis 2, taking specific notice of verses 7-9, 15-17, and 20-25.

- What do we learn about God from these passages?
- What are some characteristics of the world God created?
- What was God's intent in creating humans?
- What was the relationship like between God and Adam and Eve?

Obviously, this is not a picture of the world we live in right now. We'll see why that's the case in the next study. God never gave up on His intention for a sinless world and intimacy with His people.

Whether God created the world in seven days, orchestrated evolution over millions of years, or the other theories that exist about creation, let's set that aside and focus on the principles of the passage as they pertain to humanity's relationship with God.



Read Revelation 21:1-4.

- How does this picture in Revelation compare to Genesis?
- How does this affect the way you read all of the Scriptures and how you see all of life?

DISCUSSION // 15 MIN

We see two beautiful pictures of a world that was and a world that is to come. In the next study we'll see what happened and how our present, broken world came to be. It's important to pause first and reflect on who and what we rejected in pursuing our own desires, and the future God promises us.

- Where do you see evidence of God's design in our world and relationships today, either flourishing or brokenness?
- Are you enjoying your relationship with God?
- What ways are you living for or running from God?
- What do you long for in your relationship with God and in his world?

PRAYER // 15 MIN

Spend some time together in prayer using the ACTS model:

In *Adoration*, praise our Creator God for including us in his design for a beautiful creation.

In Confession, focus on the ways that we reject God's design or run from our relationship with Him.

In *Thanksgiving*, rejoice in our God who created us with a purpose and an identity.

In *Supplication*, cry out for the need for the good news.



Lesson 2 SIN – GOD SAVES SINNERS

_

BIG IDEA

The picture of God's creation in Genesis 1 and 2 is starkly different to the reality of our world today. It is important to understand the root of the brokenness around and in us, how that sin impacts our relationship with God, and how it affects the world.

Life Question. Share a time where you were acutely aware of sin in your own life or the world.

BIBLE CONVERSATION // 30 MIN

Just one chapter after the beauty of creation, things start to unravel with significant consequences to us today.

Read Genesis 3, taking specific notice of verses 1-6, 8, 12, 14-19.

- What stands out to you from this passage?
- Why were Adam and Eve deceived by the serpent? What about his message made it enticing for them to eat from the tree?
- What is the root sin of Adam and Eve?
 Read Psalm 53:6. How would you define the condition of sin?
 Read Romans 3:23. How would you define the activity of sin?
- What changes occur with Adam and Eve after they eat from the tree?
- What is God's response?



DISCUSSION // 15 MIN

Sin is insidious with grave consequences. New City Catechism defines sin as the rejecting or ignoring God in the world he created, rebelling against him by living without reference to him, not being or doing what he requires in his law—resulting in our death and the disintegration of all creation. It involves actions, thoughts, attitudes, and heart postures. One of the dangers we face is not realizing the subtle ways sin controls our lives and creeps into all areas of life.

Read Romans 6:23.

- What is a wage?
- What does it mean for the wages of sin to be death? Do you believe this is a fitting consequence? Why or why not?
- Where do you see the brokenness in our relationship with God play out in your own life? Community? World? Who do you blame? What do you believe is the solution?

PRAYER // 15 MIN

Spend some time together in prayer using the ACTS model:

In Adoration, praise our Father for his holiness.

In *Confession*, confess the condition of your sin, how you live for yourself. Confess the activity of your sin, the areas where sin impacts the way you act, think, feel, work, watch, love, etc. Be specific.

In *Thanksgiving*, rejoice that our God did not abandon us after we sinned.

In $\it Supplication$, cry out for strength and His empowering to fight sin.



Lesson 3 JESUS – THROUGH JESUS CHRIST'S LIFE, DEATH, & RESURRECTION

BIG IDEA

We left last week in a bit of a mess, the bad news. In order to understand *why* Christ died, we had to first cover the part of who we were created to be and who we are. Now it's time to talk about the good news, the part where God moved forward in spite of our sin. The part where God promised to bring an ultimate deliverer.

Life Question. Share a time where you experienced the tangible grace of God. Where do you see evidence in your own life or in the world of attempts to make things right in our own doing?

BIBLE CONVERSATION // 30 MIN

The gospel is a beautiful story because it doesn't end in Genesis 3.

Read Ephesians 2:1-10.

- How does this passage reflect the truths we've discussed so far in this study? How would you describe life before Jesus (v. 1-3)? How would you describe life after Jesus (v. 4-10)?
- What was God's motivation in acting?
- What is God's role? What is Jesus' role?
- What is man's role?
- What is now true of those who are saved?



DISCUSSION // 15 MIN

This passage is an encapsulation of the Gospel. It paints a picture of the life we lived before Christ and the beauty of his response. We are deserving of wrath, but God in his great love showed us mercy and grace. What a beautiful reality we live in! And what a wonderful God we follow!

- How do you view yourself on a regular basis? Like a child of wrath (v. 4) or alive with Christ (v. 5)?
- The verses focus on Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. Now read Matthew 10:45, John 3:16, 2 Corinthians 5:21, and 1 Peter 1:18 & 3:18. How would you summarize what Jesus did in order to save you?
- What should our response to God be?
- What does it look like to live in light of the grace given to us by God?

PRAYER // 15 MIN

If you've never placed your faith in Christ, this is a great time to do so. Declare you believe and ask God to forgive you.

Admit to God that you are a sinner in need of forgiveness.

Believe that Jesus is God's son and died and resurrected, and now offers you forgiveness. Confess your faith in Jesus as Lord and Savior.

Spend some time together in prayer using the ACTS model.

In *Adoration*, praise God for what He has done for you through His son Jesus.

In *Confession*, focus on the ways we forget what he has done for us and for the whole world.

In *Thanksgiving*, thank Jesus for the circumstances, people, conversations, etc. that led to your belief and salvation in Jesus.

In *Supplication*, ask Him to help you live for Christ fully. And cry out for what is yet to come, for Jesus' return.



Lesson 4

WHAT'S TRUE NOW? GOD SAVED SINNERS THROUGH JESUS CHRIST'S LIFE, DEATH, & RESURRECTION

BIG IDEA

The Gospel impacts much more than just our eternal destination (which is still important!). It transforms the entirety of our lives now, both in how we live and our standing before God. Our restored relationship with God begins the moment we accept Jesus as Savior. Our final study in this Rooted series looks at what is true of us now because of the work of Jesus.

Life Question: What is an area in your life you have seen God transform since becoming a Christian (think, do, love, relationships, identity, etc.)? In what ways do you struggle with feeling fully accepted by God?

BIBLE CONVERSATION // 30 MIN

God has blessed us tremendously in this life. Paul writes about that to begin his letter to the Ephesians. Let's look at the abundant ways God has shown us his love and mercy.

Read Ephesians 1:1-14.

- According to this passage, what blessings has God given to his children?
- What was God's motivation in giving you these blessings?
- Of all the blessings in v. 3-10, are there any that are particularly impactful/special/meaningful to you?
- What role does the Holy Spirit play in this passage? How does His role as seal give us confidence in our relationship with God?
- Read John 1:12. How does this summarize what we've just read? If you believe it, how will it transform the way you live?



DISCUSSION // 15 MIN

As we move into a time of discussion, let's remember the goal of this study to understand what it means to live rooted in our faith, anchored to the Father through the work of Jesus Christ on our behalf for fullness of life, nourishment in relationship with our loving God. We will continue to hash out where to carry our 10 words we have in our back pocket: "God saved sinners through Jesus Christ's life, death, and resurrection."

If you want to receive Christ today, right now, Romans 10:9-10 is a great place to go. If you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes and is justified, and with the mouth one confesses and is saved.

Eph4.1-15 One Body Invested: I therefore, ma prisoner for the Lord, urge you to nwalk in a manner worthy of othe calling to which you have been called, 2 with all phumility and agentleness, with patience, sbearing with one another in love, 3 eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. 4 There is none body and yone Spirit—just as you were called to the one whope that belongs to your call—5 xone Lord, yone faith, zone baptism, 6 none God and Father of all, bwho is over all and through all and in all. 7 But cgrace was given dto each one of us eaccording to the measure of Christ's gift. 8 Therefore it says, f'When he ascended on high ghe led a host of captives, and he gave gifts to men."19 (hIn saying, "He ascended," what does it mean but that he had also descended into ithe lower regions, the earth?2 10 He who descended is the one who also jascended kfar above all the heavens, that he might Ifill all things.) And mhe gave the napostles, the prophets, the oevangelists, the pshepherds3 and teachers.4 12 gto equip the saints for the work of ministry, for rbuilding up the body of Christ, 13 until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, uto mature manhood,5 to the measure of the stature of whe fullness of Christ, 14 so that we may no longer be children, wtossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in xdeceitful schemes. 15 Rather, yspeaking the truth in love, we are to zgrow up in every way into him who is athe head, into Christ, 16 bfrom whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love.

1Cor11.17-34 Conscientious: But in the following instructions I do not commend you, because when you come together it is not for the better but for the worse. 18 For, in the first place, when you come together as a church, <u>r</u>I hear that there are divisions among you. And I believe it in part, <u>4</u> 19 for <u>s</u>there must be factions among you in order <u>t</u>that those who are genuine among you may be recognized. 20 When you come together, it is not the Lord's supper that you eat. 21 For in eating, each one goes ahead with his own meal. One goes hungry, <u>u</u>another gets drunk. 22 What! Do you not have houses to eat and drink in? Or do you despise <u>v</u>the church of God and <u>w</u>humiliate those who have nothing? What shall I say to you? Shall I commend you in this? No, I will not.

23 For <u>x</u>I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that <u>y</u>the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, 24 and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, "This is my body which is for <u>5</u> you. Do this in remembrance of me." <u>6</u> 25 In the same way also he took the cup, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." <u>26</u> For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death <u>y</u>until he comes.

27 <u>a</u>Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord <u>b</u>in an unworthy manner will be guilty concerning <u>c</u>the body and blood of the Lord. 28 <u>d</u>Let a person examine himself, then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. 29 For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment on himself. 30 That is why many of you are weak and ill, and some <u>e</u>have died. <u>7</u> 31 <u>f</u>But if we judged <u>8</u> ourselves truly, we would not be judged. 32 But when we are judged by the Lord, gwe are disciplined <u>9</u> so that we may not be <u>h</u>condemned along with the world.

33 So then, my brothers, 10 when you come together to eat, wait for 11 one another -34 if anyone is hungry, ilet him eat at home—so that when you come together it will not be for judgment. About the other things kI will give directions lwhen I come.

1Cor13 Love: If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. 2 And if I have aprophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, bso as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. 3 cIf I give away all I have, and dif I deliver up my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing. 4 eLove is patient and fkind; love gdoes not envy or boast; it his not arrogant 5 or rude. It idoes not insist on its own way; it jis not irritable or resentful; 6 it kdoes not rejoice at wrongdoing, but lrejoices with the truth. 7 mLove bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, eendures all things. 8 Love never ends. As for prophecies, they will pass away; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will pass away. 9 For nwe know in part and we prophesy in part, 10 but owhen the perfect comes, the partial will pass away. 11 When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I gave up childish ways. 12 For pnow we see in a mirror dimly, but on face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as rI have been fully known. 13 So now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

1Cor12.12-31 Invested Gifts: For just as <u>i</u>the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, <u>i</u>so it is with Christ. 13 For <u>k</u>in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—<u>l</u>Jews or Greeks, slaves <u>4</u> or free—and <u>m</u>all were made to drink of one Spirit.



14 For the body does not consist of one member but of many. 15 If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. 16 And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. 17 If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? 18 But as it is, nGod arranged the members in the body, each one of them, oas he chose. 19 If all were a single member, where would the body be? 20 As it is, there are many parts, 5 yet one body. 21 The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." 22 On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, 23 and on those parts of the body that we think less honorable we bestow the greater honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, 24 which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, 25 that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. 26 If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, pall rejoice together. 27 Now gyou are the body of Christ and individually members of it. 28 And sGod has appointed in the church first tapostles, second uprophets, third teachers, then may be healing, wadministrating, and warious kinds of tongues. 29 Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? 30 Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret? 31 But zearnestly desire the higher gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way.

Rom12.1-8 Invested Gifts: I appeal to you therefore, brothers 1 by the mercies of God, ato present your bodies bas a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship.2 2 cDo not be conformed to this world,3 but be transformed by dthe renewal of your mind, that by testing you may ediscern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.4 3 For fby the grace given to me I say to everyone among you gnot to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, heach according to ithe measure of faith that God has assigned. 4 For jas in one body we have many members,5 and the members do not all have the same function, 5 so we, kthough many, lare one body in Christ, and individually members one of another. 6 nHaving gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if oprophecy, pin proportion to our faith; 7 if qservice, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; 8 the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; rethe one who leads,6 with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with scheerfulness.
