UHE SEVENTEENTH-ANNUAL St. Michael Liturgical Conference is Monday, September 29. This year the conference falls on the Feast of St. Michael, which will be commemorated at the Holy Mass and Solemn Vespers.

Overview

Since 1998, Zion has hosted the St. Michael Liturgical Conference for pastors and others concerned with the Evangelical-Lutheran Liturgy. Stressing the practical application of Lutheran liturgical theology, the conference informs participants of the liturgy's rite, rubric, and ceremony so that they may make informed decisions about local customs in their parishes.

The conference has three major components:

- ₩ Worship
- ★ Keynote Address
- ▼ Sectional Presentations

The keynote address establishes the theme for the conference, and the sectional presentations are designed to study in detail the conduct of the liturgy.



Conference Speakers



Sectional Speakers include: the Rev. Dr. Daniel G. Reuning, kantor at Redeemer—Fort Wayne (Gregorian Pointing and Chanting of the Psalms); the Rev. Fr. Joel R. Baseley, pastor of Emmanuel—Dearborn (C.F.W. Walther on Confirmation and First Communion); the Rev. Dr. Burnell F. Eckardt, pastor of St. Paul's—Kewanee, IL (Touch: An Incarnational Expression of the Gospel); and the Rev. Fr. Mark P. Braden, Zion's Pastor. The Rev. Fr.

David H. Petersen, pastor of Redeemer – Fort Wayne, will preach at Mass.

Christian Church. It is the day on which, in 1517, at noon on the eve of All Saints Day, Dr. Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. It is recognized—in retrospect—as the act that began the Reformation, although at the time that is not what Luther intended. The 95 Theses, properly titled A Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences, were a set of theological treatises that railed against the popish practice of selling the forgiveness of sins. Luther's concerns were rooted in theology, but were also quite pastoral—as is all true theology—he was concerned with the faith of the Christians, and the salvation of their souls. False doctrine and false practice are always injurious to faith.

Some thirteen years later, on June 25, the Year of our Lord 1530, the biblical faith that compelled Luther to post the 95 Theses found full expression in the Augsburg Confession, the Confession of Faith requested by an emperor trying to hold his empire together. It is the Fourth Article of that Confession, the *Augustana*, which asserts of the Lutherans:

"They teach that men cannot be justified before God by their own strength, merits, or works, but are freely justified for Christ's

from the Introit for the Festival of the Reformation

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September/October Calendar sake, through faith, when they believe that they are received into favor, and that their sins are forgiven for Christ's sake, who, by His death, has made satisfaction for our sins. This faith God imputes for righteousness in His sight (Romans 3.21-26; 4.5)."

While *Augustana* IV cites Romans as the *sedes doctrinae*, or seat of doctrine, for the chief article of the Christian faith, we know from Luther's introduction to his own works in Latin that he found the Gospel, or the Gospel found him, in Psalms, Galatians, and Hebrews as well. In his lectures at Wittenberg, he taught these books in the years leading up to 1517. As he describes his struggles with sin and righteousness, Luther refers to Romans 1.16-17, and St. Paul's citation of Habakkuk 2.4:

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith; as it is written, "The just shall live by faith."

If "the just shall live by faith," and Scripture clearly asserts exactly that, it is impossible that the sale of forgiveness by the church can lead to righteousness. The 95 Theses were quickly proven right. With the central article of the Christian faith clearly established and publicly confessed, like a house of cards in which the lowest card is removed, the entire popish system of doctrine and fundraising collapsed. But more importantly, the Gospel of Jesus Christ was publicly proclaimed. And it is that proclamation, the clear, salvific preaching of the Holy Gospel, that brings the fruits of the Reformation to you.

This year again Zion celebrates the Reformation with a special sung Mass on **Friday**, **October 31**, at **7pm** in the church. Please plan to join us! ▼

EVERY TWO YEARS, the American Guild of Organists holds a national convention. This year it was in Boston, June 23-27. I was able to attend 7 recitals and concerts by world-renowned organists and music ensembles at churches in Boston and Cambridge, as well as choral Compline at a Roman parish, choral Vespers at First Lutheran Church

(LCMS), and choral Evensong at the Church of the Advent, an Anglian parish formerly served by Fr. Charles McClean, now a Lutheran clergyman who was a presenter at our St. Michael Liturgical Conference.



Additionally there were workshops and scholarly papers. Of over 100 choices, I attended Advanced Choral Conducting, Re-

hearsal Techniques and Repertoire for Children's Choirs, and Music of Integrity for Small Choirs.

There was time to browse choral and organ music from various publishers and visit with other organists from across the country. It was a busy week, but very worthwhile. I hope to attend the next convention June 19-23, 2016, in Houston.

The Flood

 $oldsymbol{\mathfrak{J}}$ N HIS GREAT mercy, God promised never to destroy the world again by water. As a symbol and sign of that promise, He has given us the rainbow. That sure promise was a great comfort on the evening of Monday, August 11, as the Rectory lower level and the Undercroft slowly filled with water. It has been over 90 years since Detroit saw that much rain in one day. Expressways were flooded, and thousands of residents of metro Detroit sustained serious water damage. Divers were brought in from the state police to search the 12 to 14 foot deep water on the local freeways for stranded motorists. Several of our members have reported significant damage from the storm.

Thanks be to God, at Zion the damage was minimal. Fifteen of our clerical vestments-including seven copes—were taken to the cleaners to remove stains caused by the water in the Undercroft, which rose to at least eight inches high. I had to replace a small handful

of books that were in briefcases next to my desk, and some electronic devices that were plugged in when the flooding hit had to be replaced. All of our computers are fine, mine started right up after a couple of days drying time.

Our portable public address system and the floor of the vestment closet may be the most costly casualties. Thanks to Sherrie Williams, our secretary, for her above-and-beyond service to Zion after the flooding, and Mr. Eddie Holmes and family for their hard work in cleaning and repairing my study and the Undercroft. Thanks also to my daughter Sarah, who spent hours cleaning the Rectory lower level helping me to reestablish my study. ▼

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Mission Work in Bolivia

3N LATE JULY, I spent a week teaching the book of Revelation in Cochabamba, Bolivia. I also lectured on hermeneutics (fundamentals of biblical interpretation) and eschatology (the doctrine of the end times). It was a wonderful experience, and greatly aided the Bolivian church. In a recent email, the Secretary General of the Bolivian church expressed their gratitude for the course, and to the members of Zion for sharing their Pastor with a small, struggling Lutheran body. After Mass July 27, I gave a presentation on the Bolivian church and my work there.



While I have traveled to several places in South America and the Caribbean on behalf of our Synod, I traveled to Bolivia in my capacity as a Fellow for the Luther Academy, an organization that is engaged in theological education across the globe. I was recommended to the Bolivian church by Dr. Sergio Fritzler, the president of the seminary in Buenos Aires, Argentina. I met Dr. Fritzler several years ago in Santo Domingo, the Dominican Republic, and I count him as a friend and colleague.

One of the unexpected parts of my Bolivian trip was the extreme altitude. Cochabamba is south and east of Lake Titicaca on the same mountain range as the highest city in the world, which is located just north of the Peruvian border. I spent the week at over 8,000 feet above sea level in the Andes Mountains. Arriving and departing, I traveled through La Paz and El Alto, which are at 12,000 and 13,000 feet above sea level respectively. As a point of comparison, Denver, Colorado, which features altitude warnings to visitors, is about 5,000 feet above sea level.

The Bolivian church was warm and welcoming, and very gracious. I made a lot of friends in my week there. I'm not sure if I'll return to Bolivia, but we are keeping the church there in our daily prayers. *

SUNDAY SCHOOL 11:30AM | ACTIVITIES CENTER | Sunday School is for ages 3-12. Lessons are Bible-story based and activities are designed to reinforce the biblical lesson. Sunday School begins September 7.

SUNDAY ADULT STUDY 11:30AM | UNDERCROFT | Our current study is "A Survey of the New Testament." This class enables parents to study the Holy Scriptures while their children attend Sunday School. Coffee and snacks are provided. Thanks to those who provide snacks. Anyone is welcome to bring donuts, bagels, fruit, etc. to share. This class is for age 13 through adult.



WEDNESDAY ADULT STUDY Immediately following Holy Mass, this study is reading "Ministry, Word, and Sacraments: An Enchiridion" by Martin Chemnitz (1522-1586), an important leader in early Lutheranism. Coffee and snacks are provided. Often the group goes out to lunch following the study.

YOUTH CATECHISM DAY AND TIME TBD | RECTORY | This class teaches the chief parts of the *Small Catechism* to learn the essential beliefs of Christianity as taught in Holy Scripture. This study of the Catechism prepares students in third—eighth grades for First Communion.

WOMEN'S GROUP TWO SATURDAYS A MONTH 1PM | RECTORY | Gathering shortly before 1, we move to the Chapel of the Holy Incarnation in the Rectory to pray the Office of Vespers and then continue with the study. Coffee and snacks are provided. We are currently studying the book of Jude. All women are encouraged to attend and bring guests.

MEN'S GROUP ONE THURSDAY A MONTH 7PM | RECTORY | Gathering shortly before 7, we move to the Church to pray the Office of Vespers, and then return to the Rectory for our study. Following the study, there is food and *Gemütlichkeit*. We are studying the Solid Declaration of the *Formula of Concord*. All men are encouraged to attend and bring guests.

ADULT CATECHESIS THREE THURSDAYS A MONTH 7PM | RECTORY | This class is for those considering membership, and existing members to review and deepen their understanding of the Christian faith, using *Luther's Small Catechism* annotated by Edward W. A. Koehler.

Institute on Liturgy, Preaching, and Church Music

■ ATTENDED THE triennial worship conference of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod July 28-31 at Concordia University—Seward, NE. This year's theme was "Comfort, Comfort, Ye My People: Praying, Preaching, and Singing the Comfort of Christ to the Troubled Conscience and Broken Heart."

The conference included notary plenary speakers Dr. John W. Kleinig, professor of Old Testament at Australian Lutheran College, and Dr. Robin A. Leaver, professor of sacred music at Westminster Choir College.

I attended a series of seminars on "It's Not Only What You Do; It's What You Get Them to Do" which helped choir conductors refine their conducting and choir directing skills, led by Dr. Charles Brown of Concordia University – River Forest, IL.

There were a number of worship services, including an opening and closing Mass and the Divine Office: Matins, Vespers, and Compline. The highpoint of the conference was a hymn festival on the hymns of Paul Gerhardt. Two fine organ recitals complimented the music throughout the conference. Five workshops on varied topics filled out the rest of the time.

As expected in a synodical event, there were both [1] strong Lutheran musical pieces and arrangements which we seek to promote and emulate, and [2] much weaker offerings that we must seek to avoid, errors which must be marked and taught against. For example, the opening Mass was very well done, and anyone familiar with Zion would have felt at home attending. The closing Mass was quite weak in liturgical content and execution and left much to be desired.

Overall, I was pleased with the conference and was glad to represent Zion. I was able to connect with a number of colleagues, college and seminary professors, and college and seminary friends.

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<u>HOLY MASS</u> is celebrated every Sunday and Wednesday at 10am, and on major feasts as announced.

<u>COMMUNICANTS</u> are baptized Christians who have been instructed in and publicly confess the Evangelical-Lutheran Faith. If you desire to commune, please visit with the Pastor before approaching the Altar.

THE DIVINE OFFICE is prayed in the Chapel of the Holy Incarnation in the Rectory. MATINS: Daily 8:45am (except when there is a morning Mass); VESPERS: Tuesday/Thursday 6:30pm.

PRIVATE CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION is available on Saturday from 9-10am or by appointment.

<u>PASTORAL CONSULTATION</u> based on the Holy Scriptures is available by appointment.

<u>THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY BAPTISM</u> is for infants and adults, and may be arranged by contacting the Pastor.

<u>COUPLES DESIRING HOLY MARRIAGE</u> should contact the Pastor before finalizing the wedding date. Bible instruction in Holy Marriage is required. All marriages are conducted by the Pastor according to Zion's usual order.

<u>New Members</u> are received by baptism, confirmation, transfer or profession of faith. Instruction in Luther's Small Catechism and Private Absolution are required for all new members. Visit with the Pastor for further details.

<u>THE SICK AND HOMEBOUND</u> are visited regularly by the Pastor. Please contact the Parish Office if you know of any parishioner in need of pastoral visitation.
