Good King Wenceslas

"Good King Wenceslas looked out, on the Feast of Stephen..."
These words, written by Englishman John Mason Neale over 150 years ago, chronicle the arduous trip of pious Wenceslas through brutal winter weather to give meat, wine and pine logs to an impoverished peasant. Neale chose a Finnish hymn tune to which he set his words. I'm guessing by now you're singing the choppy tune in your head. It is unclear from recorded history whether or not Wenceslas actually made the trip much sung about.

Although well known among us, the carol "Good King Wenceslas" isn't in our hymnal, of course. It is a carol, not a hymn. It isn't fit for use by the Holy Church in worship. The hymns included in our hymnal are centered on Christ, and His atoning death and glorious resurrection. We sing of what Jesus has done for us, not of our works. That said, Wenceslas is on the Western Sanctoral calendar, or has, as is commonly said, a "Saint's Day," a set day on which he is commemorated in thanksgiving to God.

The Epistle to the Hebrews teaches us that it is good and right to remember those who have gone before us with the sign of faith. The 11th chapter begins "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. For by it the elders obtained a

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September/October Calendar good testimony." What follows is a list of many of the great Saints of old, and the demonstration of saving faith in their lives.

After giving many examples of faith in their lives, the Scripture chronicles the mistreatment of the saints by the fallen world, which culminates in the martyrdom of the faithful. Chapter 12 begins "Since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us..." From the lives of the faithful departed, we are to learn how God worked to strengthen and sustain them in tribulation, and from that we are to receive comfort as we face the struggles of life in this fallen world. God kept His promises to them, so too He keeps His promises to us.

But while their example brings us comfort, we do not look to them for help or salvation. We do not seek their intercession on our behalf. Hebrews continues "...looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God." Faith looks to Jesus, the Lord of the faithful departed, the Lord who died that our sins be forgiven, and rose for our justification. He alone is our Help and our Salvation. It is He that makes us One with the saints of old, One with those who have gone before us with the sign of faith, One Holy Church, One Body, of which Christ Jesus is Head. It is of Him that we sing in the hymns of the Church, for in Him alone do we trust, as our fathers and mothers in the faith trusted.

There really was a Wenceslas. He was a Bohemian prince that died at a very young age in the Year of our Lord 929. He was thrust into his role as a teenage prince when his mother's violent tendencies became too much for her subjects. Since paganism had a deep hold on Bohemia in the 10th century, the Christian Prince Wenceslas met with strong opposition, and was probably murdered by his brother Boleslav. Put to death for his faith, Wenceslas is rightly remembered as a Christian prince and mar-

tyr. The day appointed for his commemoration in thanksgiving to God is September 28th.

Eighteenth Annual St. Michael Liturgical Conference: September 28, 2014

The St. Michael Liturgical Conference is scheduled for, you guessed it, Monday, September 28, 2015 A. ♣ D., the Commemoration of St. Wenceslas. Our annual conference that focuses on the Holy Liturgy is held on the Monday closest to the Feast of St. Michael, Archangel, which always falls on the September 29th. This year Fr. Charles Evanson returns to Zion to serve as our keynote presenter. Fr. Evanson was the first keynote presenter for the St. Michael conference, held 18 years ago in 1997. Fr. Evanson is a true Churchman and scholar. He has served as Pastor of four Lutheran congregations, and as a theological educator and Professor in many different countries. He will be presenting a paper on "Liturgical Renewal in Missouri." His paper will discuss the movement that brought liturgical worship back to our churches. This happened during the time of our own Pastors Runge and Evans, both of whom were leaders in the effort to restore the Holy Liturgy and reverent, liturgical worship to our churches.

Fr. Burnell Eckardt, General Editor of *Gottesdienst* magazine and Pastor of St. Paul Evangelical-Lutheran Church of Kewanee, Illinois, will also present again this year. Fr. Eckardt will discuss the role of Dr. Robert Preus, President of our Fort Wayne seminary, in restoring Confessional Lutheran theology to our Synod, which brought with it a return to liturgical worship.

The Reverend Doctor Daniel Reuning will also return to our Conference this year. Kantor Reuning served as Dean of our Seminary Chapel and Professor of theology and music for 32 years. He is the Director of the Fort Wayne Bach Collegium, perhaps the finest musical expression of Bach's work in the country. Members of the panel will include our presenters, select editors of *Gottesdienst* magazine, and a special guest: Fr. Charles McClean, previously a keynote speaker at our Conference.

2 Timothy 2:15

Does he, then, who is justified in this way, freely for Christ's sake by faith, need anything more for salvation?

Paul certainly denies that plainly, Ro 4:5-6. There he maintains that the way in which we are justified and in which we are saved is one and the same, so that he who has justification by faith, the same by that very fact has adoption, blessedness, or salvation and their inheritance of life eternal. Therefore, just as we are justified freely, by faith lone, for the sake of Christ, without our works-as Paul points out on surest grounds, so that namely the promise of both righteousness and salvation might be firm and sure, Ro 4:16 – so it is therefore falsely taught that our good works are necessary or our justification and no one can be justifies without his good works, [and] so it is also not rightly said that good works are necessary for salvation and that no one can be saved without his good works. For though true faith neither can nor ought to be without good works, yet good works do not enter to join in²⁴ or circle (as Luther says) of either justification or salvation.



A Quiet Time

"Silence and reverence in God's House." What a blessing we enjoy in our parish to make preparatory petitions in holy quiet prior to the start of Mass. Indeed many congregations have replaced silence with socializing, and reverence with reverie. Blessed are you who maintain awe before the Holy God, and a self-reflective atmosphere in the nave of our church, especially in those critical minutes before the bells introduce the Mass procession. The bells rung at 15 minutes before Mass (except for in penitential seasons) are the "call bells", and it is a good routine to arrive at church before these toll in order to be spiritually prepared for Our Lord's service.

Martin Luther on the Sacraments

Now examine further the efficacy and benefits on account of which really the Sacrament was instituted; which is also its most necessary part, that we may know what we should seek and obtain there. Now this is plain and clear from the words just mentioned: This is My body and blood, given and shed FOR YOU, for the remission of sins. Briefly that is as much as to say: "for this reason we go to the Sacrament because there we receive such a treasure by and in which we obtain forgiveness of sins. Why so? Because the words stand here and give us this; for on this account He bids me eat and drink, that it maybe my own and benefit me, as a sure pledge and token, yea, the very same treasure that is appointed for me against my sins, death, and every calamity.

On this account it is indeed called a food of souls, which nourishes and strengthens the new man. For by Baptism we are first born anew; but (as we said before) there still remains, beside s, the old vicious nature of flesh and blood in man, there are so many hindrances and temptations of the devil and of the world that we often become weary and faint, and sometimes also stumble.

Therefore it is given for a daily pasture and sustenance, that faith may refresh and strengthen itself so as not to fall back in such a battle, but become **HOLY MASS** is celebrated every Sunday and Wednesday at 10am, and on major feasts as announced.

<u>COMMUNICANTS</u> are baptized Christians who have been instructed in and publicly confess the Evangelical-Lutheran Faith. If you desire to commune, please visit with the Pastor before approaching the Altar.

THE DIVINE OFFICE is prayed in the Chapel of the Holy Incarnation in the Rectory. MATINS: Daily 8:45am (except when there is a morning Mass); VESPERS: Thursday 6:30pm.

<u>PRIVATE CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION</u> is available on Saturday from 9-10am or by appointment.

<u>PASTORAL CONSULTATION</u> based on the Holy Scriptures is available by appointment.

THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY BAPTISM is for infants and adults, and may be arranged by contacting the Pastor.

<u>COUPLES DESIRING HOLY MARRIAGE</u> should contact the Pastor before finalizing the wedding date. Bible instruction in Holy Marriage is required. All marriages are conducted by the Pastor according to Zion's usual order.

<u>New Members</u> are received by baptism, confirmation, transfer or profession of faith. Instruction in Luther's Small Catechism and Private Absolution are required for all new members. Visit with the Pastor for further details.

<u>THE SICK AND HOMEBOUND</u> are visited regularly by the Pastor. Please contact the Parish Office if you know of any parishioner in need of pastoral visitation.
