

Eighth Sunday After Pentecost

July 15, 2018 Abiding in Christ

It is good you are gathered with the Faithful to be fed by Our Lord at this Holy Mass. In spite of what you may see, the multitude of angels, archangels, and blessed dead are with you as well. May this feast strengthen and encourage you!

The Theme of Today's Liturgy God's never-failing providence directs all things in heaven and on earth (*Collect*). He does this not for a show of force but because of His compassion (*Gospel*). This compassion moves Our Lord to meet our greatest need—freeing us from the things of death so that we may live and abide in His holiness and righteousness (*Epistle*). And so we look to the Lord (*Gradual*), and shout to God with the voice of triumph (*Introit*). For the Lord God is good to us, and His mercy extends over all His works.

The Sermon "I have compassion on the multitude", the Lord said. He had compassion because they were His creatures. He himself knew great hunger by His forty-day fast in the wilderness. But there He was not tempted to make miraculous bread. Now He was concerned that those who came to hear Him would faint on the way. What He would not do for Himself, He did for them. He gave them heavenly bread to eat. They ate and were filled. He sent them away. For what He would do next only He could do. He would go the Way of the Cross. But on that Way, the Way of Suffering, He did not faint. He endured through those dark hours on Calvary, where His true compassion for the multitude is seen. And the fruit of that tree He multiplies that you eat miraculous Food this day, that you eat and be filled with Christ.

The Holy Eucharist Compassion characterizes the giving of Our Lord's Body and Blood, and confidence characterizes the receiving of the Blessed Sacrament. In the midst of both, Our Lord bestows his abundant blessing because He satisfies us with the finest Food.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 47. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

The emotional outburst of hand-clapping and shouting (v 1) is inspired not so much by Our Lord's sheer power but by His rescue of us from the enemy within us (v 2-3) and the inheritance He mercifully gives us (v 4). So the shout that accompanies Our Lord's Ascension (v 5) is the song of praise and thanksgiving that confesses more His gifts than His might (v 6-7). And His rule over the nations (v 8) is not a reign of terror, or even a rule by force, but the forgiveness, mercy and compassion that is the rule among the Faithful (v 9).
